

Important Admissions Updates February 2014

Applications are still open for many programs for Fall 2014. Students are encouraged to apply as soon as possible. Check out http://www.ufv.ca/admissions/admissions/acceptapps/ to see what program are still accepting applications.

UFV has made many improvements to the admissions process for 2014:

1. Self-reported grades - UFV will now be utilizing students' interim grades from the BC Ministry of Education (PSI). Please ask your students to submit their PSI

- 2. Communication Applicants will now receive all communication to their personal and MyUFV email accounts as they progress through the application process. Please ask them to ensure a personal email is provided on their application, and encourage them to check their MyUFV account often. UFV will send only the final admission letter to the student by postal mail all other correspondence will be via email.
- Conditional Admission Most grade 12 students will receive an early confirmation email that they have been conditionally admitted. Further review of their interim grades will provide them with a follow-up decision, if required.

UFV Theatre Presents Contemporary Version of Romeo and Juliet

UFV Theatre presents a contemporary version of William Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet. Adapted and directed by Paul Gélineau, the production runs March 5 – 23 at UFV's Performance Theatre at 45635 Yale Road (at Airport Road) in Chilliwack. Preview performances are on March 5 and 6. The opening night performance and reception is on March 7 and 7:30 pm performances continue on March 8, 14, 15, 20, 21, and 22. The two Sunday matinees at 2 pm are on March 16 and 23. Student matinees at 12 pm are on March 12 and 13. Ticket prices range from \$11 to \$23 (plus service fees) and are available for purchase by phone at 604-795-2814 and online at www.UFV.ca/theatre.

UFV Theatre continues its tradition of educating students and entertaining Fraser Valley audiences with a spring Shakespeare production. Featuring seductive love poetry and thrilling stage combat, this version of Romeo and Juliet is set in a post-apocalyptic Verona. Surrounded by violence and chaos, a pair of star-cross'd lovers from feuding families take their lives.

"Everybody understands how much it means to love and how much it can hurt to love and everybody understands feuding," said Paul Gélineau, director.

While the original play was first written by Shakespeare around 1595, UFV Theatre's production has been adapted for a contemporary audience by UFV Sessional Instructor and renowned Fight Director, Paul Gélineau. Gélineau has received local, national, and international recognition for his fight direction. UFV Theatre's production of Romeo and Julier will feature 24 student actors, 21 students and alumni working as designers and production crew members, and Chilliwack School of the Performing Arts student Bethany Meyers in the role of Queen Mab.

Dear Parents/Students:

Cellular phone thefts and robberies are on the rise because wireless devices can be sold for cash on the black market by criminals.

In an effort to curb this from occurring a new industry-led database to blacklist lost or stolen wireless devices has been established. By reporting the International Mobile Equipment Identity (IMEI) of your device to your wireless provider you can render it virtually worthless as the device's operating features will be disabled.

To find the IMEI number:

- · Type *#06# on the call screen
- · Check behind the battery on a white label
- · Look on the box the device came in

If your phone is lost or stolen:

- · Contact your local police department to report it
- · Report the IMEI number to your Canadian wireless provider

To determine if a device has been lost or stolen:
